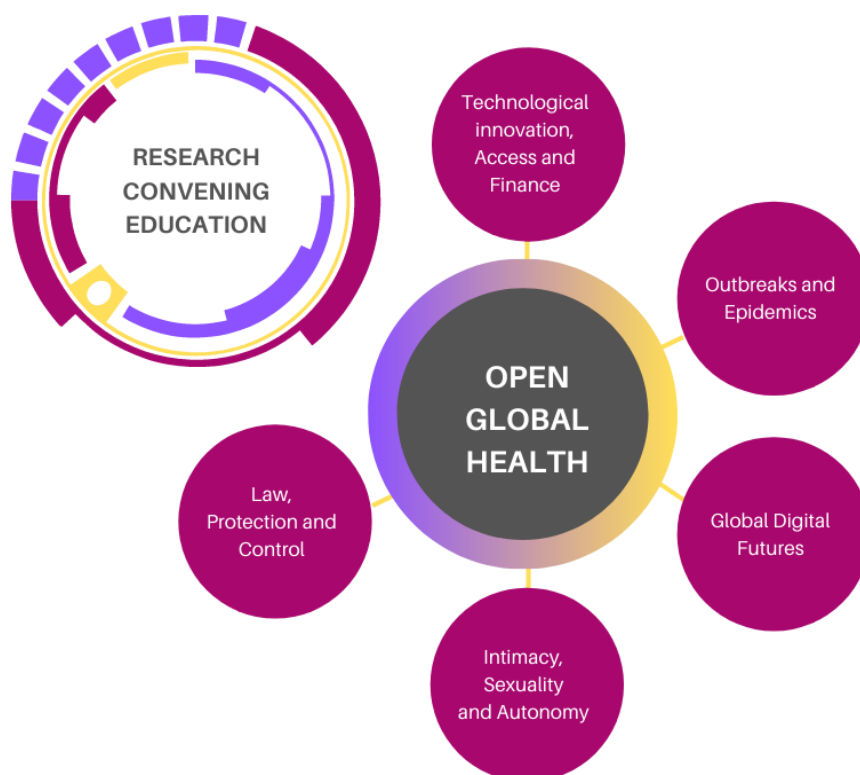

# MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND DEVELOPMENTS

With new epidemic outbreaks, climate change, and other threats reshaping the politics and economics of many countries, the global health ecosystem is constantly evolving. To better address these challenges, the Global Health Centre formulated a **new strategy**, redefined its mission and set key objectives for the upcoming four years. The new vision of the Centre aims to open global health to diverse voices, knowledge and ideas through research, convening and education. From 2020 to 2024, the Centre commits to engage with issues of governance, politics and power through an open and transparent approach in order to advance health policies. The GHC will actively promote collaboration that bridges Global North/South divides, within academia and beyond, bringing in governments, civil society, journalists, the private sector, and other stakeholders, to discuss and tackle global health issues. The Centre will pay special attention to geopolitics, concerns of transparency and accountability, the impact of (neo)colonialism on global health, and populations often excluded from governance. The Centre selected five specific areas of work for 2020-2024 to consolidate its efforts and better coordinate its research, convening and education activities. In 2020, the Centre also adopted a new visual identity to mark its strategic changes and reflect its new Open Global Health vision.

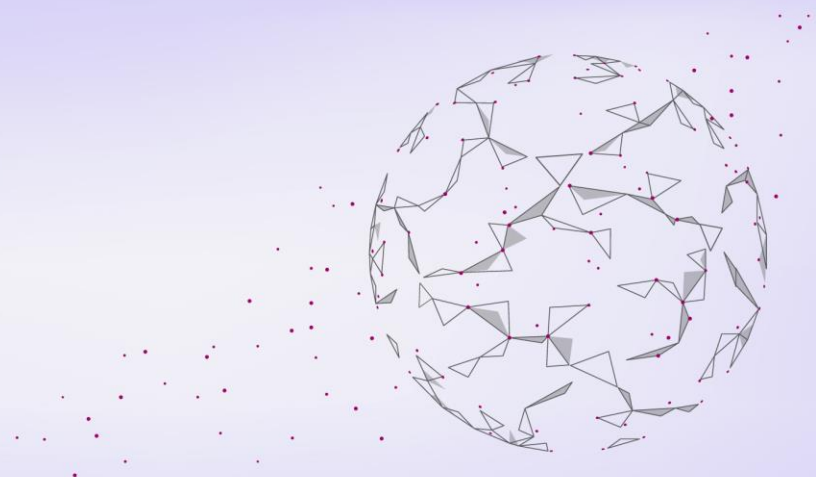
The Global Health Centre experienced significant growth during the year, and reoriented some of its activities due to the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2020, the GHC conducted 10 research projects exploring major health issues, and hosted two additional projects investigating the impact of digital technologies and artificial intelligence on health. Major progress was made in fostering collaboration and breaking down silos between research

projects, allowing true synergies to develop. GHC researchers published 79 publications, including two books, two book chapters, six working papers, 21 peer-reviewed articles and several opinion pieces, blogs and policy insights.

The 2020 course offering of the Centre was reconceptualised and adapted due to sanitary measures. Three executive training courses focusing on trade and intellectual property, global health instruments, and global health diplomacy were delivered to 58 mid- and senior-career level professionals from diverse countries.

The Centre organised 41 public conferences, panel discussions and lectures with international actors such as the UN Foundation, WHO, UHC2030, Women in Global Health and STOPAIDS. As every year, the **International Geneva Global Health Platform** hosted its famous Geneva Health Week during the World Health Assembly, which gathered over 2000 participants. In March, the Centre launched a new series of conversations on the coronavirus to provide an in-depth analysis of the crisis with experts from the legal, financial, human rights and digital health sector. A monthly Open Global Health series of events was also developed in September to provide quality debate on issues of power, transparency and inequality in global health. The GHC held additional webinars on access to medicines, seminars and other virtual events to present recently-published research findings. In total, 6,792 people participated to these discussions and the video recordings generated 5,860 views.

The coronavirus crisis considerably affected the work of GHC members who conducted additional research on the evolution of the outbreak and its social, economic and political consequences. The Centre actively contributed to the global Covid-19 debate by participating in international meetings such as the World Health Summit, the Annual International G20 Conference, the Geneva Trade Week and the European Health Forum of Gastein. In addition, GHC researchers shared their Covid-19 reflections and observations on many TV shows, radio programmes and press articles. GHC faculty and staff members were interviewed or profiled in 355 international media outlets, including the New York Times, Radio Télévision Suisse; Le Temps, the BBC, CNN, NZZ, Afrique Magazine, the Washington Post, Radio Canada, and Euronews. With the development of new activities, and the implementation of virtual events, the outreach of the Centre significantly evolved during the year. The GHC gained 2,092 new Twitter followers, 1,004 newsletter subscribers, and 804 LinkedIn readers.



# RESEARCH

As a leading institution in global health, the GHC explores critical and emerging challenges through its research, and promotes collaboration within academia and beyond. The work of the Centre encompasses diverse projects, which draw on cross-disciplinary thinking across anthropology & sociology, international relations & political science, law, history, economics, science & technology studies, and public health and medicine. The research of the GHC focuses on five themes, while promoting collaboration across them in response to fast-changing events:

- Technological innovation, access and finance
- Outbreaks and epidemics
- Global digital futures
- Intimacy, sexuality and autonomy
- Law, protection and control

To fulfil its research objectives, the Centre also incubates external projects, welcomes visiting fellows, hosts research workshops, and publishes a series of working papers. In 2020, the GHC conducted 12 research projects on access to medicines, the benefits of pathogen sharing, the impact of financialisation on the development of pharmaceuticals, polio eradication, transactional sex in forced displacement, outbreak preparedness, the opportunities and risks of new technologies, and many other topics. The Centre successfully completed four projects in 2020 and received two grant approvals for 2021. The following pages provide an overview of all the research projects of the GHC and highlight the major developments that took place in 2020.



## COVID-19 WORKING GROUP

In response to the Covid-19 crisis, the Centre formed a working group of researchers from multiple disciplines to track daily developments in the outbreak and societal responses to it. The group examined research and development of new drugs, therapeutics and vaccines, and analysed challenges in access; monitored compliance with international law; tracked trade and travel restrictions; analysed economic impacts of the outbreak; explored potential future data-sharing and digital health opportunities; and identified human rights threats in the response. The interdisciplinary discussions of the Covid-19 Working Group led to the development of 12 public webinars. These virtual events provided an in-depth analysis of the pandemic with experts from the Graduate Institute as well as international health specialists.

## ACTIVE, ONGOING RESEARCH PROJECTS

### NEW BUSINESS MODELS FOR GOVERNING INNOVATION AND GLOBAL ACCESS TO MEDICINES

The objective of this project is to deepen understanding of the political, economic, scientific and organisational factors required to implement new business models of medicines R&D that will deliver both innovation and globally affordable medicines. The project investigates competing conceptualisations of R&D, the history and scope of "new business models" for medicines innovation, and identifies what led to their creation as alternatives to the status quo. However, the Covid-19 pandemic has pushed the project to evolve in new ways, as the crisis led to the development of many R&D initiatives for diagnostics, drugs and vaccines that significantly differ from the mainstream model.

### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

The research team developed a solid, in-depth understanding of the functioning of the traditional R&D model, and a draft typology of other "new" business models such as those for neglected diseases of poverty, emerging infectious disease, rare diseases and antibiotics. In 2020, the team conducted in-depth investigations and literature reviews on the current model of R&D of biomedical technologies, and a mapping of organisations possibly implementing new business models of R&D. Three new research syntheses were produced analysing the roles of different actors in the R&D process. In partnership with the Knowledge Network for Innovation and Access to Medicines, the project developed public webinars on strategic topics such as public funding of R&D from US NIH, public funding of R&D through pension funds, R&D costs of cancer medicines, as well as a special webinar covering R&D for Covid-19 medicines. In addition, the team published a [working paper](#) on non-commercial R&D initiatives. The study analysed and compared commercial and non-commercial initiatives conducting biomedical R&D for neglected diseases with respect to costs, timeframes and success rates in order to shed light on existing and potential new business models. The project is now entering a new phase of gathering original empirical data and producing new analysis on alternate business models, with interviews of potential new models for health R&D. The Centre is also submitting research grant proposals to further partnerships with organisations in the Global South to generate original information about pharmaceutical innovation in LMICs and analyse how they compare to mainstream business models.



# THE IMPACT OF FINANCIALISATION ON GLOBAL HEALTH: A SERIES OF PHARMACEUTICAL CASE STUDIES (FINPHARM)

The central objective of this research is to examine the impact of financialisation on the development and use of pharmaceuticals in three areas of global health significance: (1) the "recycling" of antiretroviral drugs for HIV prevention (2) the search for effective treatments and vaccine for Ebola Virus Disease, and (3) the development of solutions for the growing global threat of antimicrobial resistance. This research uses an innovative interdisciplinary approach that brings together expertise in understanding how the worlds of finance and pharmaceuticals work and interact.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

The project began with an extended literature review about the history of financial actors in the pharmaceutical industry, and the impacts of financialisation on health. In collaboration with clinicians, the team defined case selection of both specific drugs and specific firms. In 2020, team members initiated research for case studies which examine the product life of specific medicines -- from drug discovery to consumption. The team collected extensive information about the biotechnology and pharmaceutical companies that have developed and commercialised the selected medicines, and examined the markets in which these drugs are sold. With the emergence of Covid-19, the team started to collect data in real time from scientific literature, from the financial sector and through collaborations within the Global Health Centre and external global health actors. In addition, project members wrote various articles and organised one **public webinar** to discuss and examine the repercussions of Covid-19 on health, finance, and trade.

The research is now entering a new phase which will expand the scope of analysis beyond specific medicines to more closely examine dynamics in specific therapeutic markets (AMR, Ebola, HIV) and the strategies of relevant pharmaceutical companies, including Gilead and Pfizer. The following manuscripts about case studies on antivirals and antibiotics are currently being developed (1) How Truvada became the top-selling HIV therapy: Antiretroviral assets, and epidemiological alchemy; (2) How rising drug prices compound the cost of health disparities; (3) What led to the creation of the fragile global supply chain that limits the access to antibiotics in Europe? The case of piperacillin tazobactam; and related to the pandemic (4) Systemically important industries: A tale of two crises.



# UNDERSTANDING THE NORMS AND PRACTICES OF PATHOGEN- AND BENEFIT-SHARING TO IMPROVE GLOBAL HEALTH SECURITY

The Pathogen-and Benefit-Sharing (PBS) Project sets out to gain an empirical understanding of an under-studied topic relevant to global health governance—how samples of pathogens from humans are shared in international scientific practice and how benefits derived from their use (such as co-authorship, intellectual property rights, and capacity building agreements) are, in turn, negotiated and shared.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

In 2020, the research team conducted several interviews on Ebola-sharing during the Ebola Viral Disease outbreak in Liberia (2014-2016) and Zika-sharing during the Zika outbreak in Brazil (2015-2016). The project adapted to the difficulties of the Covid-19 pandemic by changing its methodology from in-person fieldwork for the Brazil case study to a longer period of online interviews between July and October 2020. In July, the research team held a workshop with project advisers, collaborators, and key experts to present a preliminary research report for discussion.

In December 2020, the team published a [working paper](#) and organised a [public event](#) to disseminate the main findings of the research. This report offers the largest publicly-available set of empirical data to date on PBS practices and calls for better PBS governance to respond to emerging infectious diseases. The study reveals that policy and practice around international PBS is in a state of flux, with growing uncertainty around the complex set of formal and informal rules that govern it. There is a growing legalisation of the practice of PBS through the implementation of the Nagoya Protocol and the wide-spread use of Material Transfer Agreements, some of which contain benefit-sharing provisions, though there is, as of yet, little standardisation and centralisation in this practice. This is, in part, due to a widespread lack of consensus around what benefits for pathogen-sharing mean in practice and what constitutes fair and equitable benefit-sharing. There is also a deficit in data sources for the movements of pathogen samples and their benefit-sharing arrangements, many of which are confidential. In response to this, consensus is growing around the need for internationally-negotiated governing frameworks for PBS, with many potential mechanisms under consideration. The research team will release additional publications in 2021 on PBS and global public goods, PBS and international law in light of the Covid-19 pandemic, and benefit-sharing in scientific practice.



## SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND TRANSACTIONAL SEX IN FORCED DISPLACEMENT: A MULTI-COUNTRY STUDY

This research project is the first comparative multi-country multi-disciplinary study to examine the sexual and reproductive health impact among displaced populations and the gendered nature of transactional sex (TS). It aims to shed light on why, when and how refugees, regardless of gender or sexual orientation, engage in TS and understand situations that renders TS sexual exploitation and abuse. The research team will explore the consequences of refugees' engagement in TS, particularly in terms of sexual and reproductive health (SRH), by identifying the needs of and barriers to SRH information and services. An emphasis will be placed on understanding how gender norms, beliefs and expectations create conditions that result in differences in terms of experience and outcome of TS in different populations and in different sites. The goal of the project is to capture the complexities of everyday realities surrounding TS and generate necessary evidence to identify gaps in policy and response and inform the development of effective and appropriate interventions.

### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

During 2020, research partners convened regularly to develop the master protocol and instruments for the research project. The protocol and instruments were finalised and submitted to the Institutional Review Board (IRB) of the Graduate Institute to obtain ethical approval. In parallel, the protocol and instruments were adapted to the local context in Jordan and translated into Arabic and the process of obtaining government approval was initiated.

Following the approval from the relevant ministries in 2020, an application will be submitted to an Institutional Review Board for ethical approval in Jordan. The team contracted a research assistant based in Istanbul to support the local approval processes and conduct the research in Turkey. The project team submitted a research proposal for conducting the research in Greece, Switzerland and France, which was approved by SNIS. In addition, a commentary addressing the impact of the crisis was published in the Sexual and Reproductive Health Matters journal.



# KNOWLEDGE NETWORK FOR INNOVATION AND ACCESS TO MEDICINES

The Knowledge Network for Innovation and Access to Medicines was created to maximise the contributions of research and analysis to promote innovation and global access to medicines. The project seeks to make the existing knowledge base more widely available and accessible to policymakers, practitioners, advocates and the public; identify and help fill information and evidence gaps; and strengthen two-way flows of knowledge between research and policy communities. Since 2018, the project has synthesised the state of knowledge on various policies, organised a **series of webinars** on new policy-relevant research, and convened regular workshops and meetings to facilitate research collaborations between various health actors.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

In 2020, the team published five new research syntheses on patentability criteria, R&D costs, R&D timeframes and success rates, and biosecurity R&D and compulsory licenses. The **Knowledge Portal** also developed its list of relevant data sources with valuable information regarding innovation and access to medicines issues. In April, team members launched a new **Covid-19 page**, providing relevant open data sources of research and development, intellectual property, and pricing, manufacturing and distribution related to Covid-19. The portal has considerably expanded its audience in 2020 by reaching 9842 people. Visits on the research syntheses pages increased by 290% in 2020, and 406% for the data sources pages. The geographical reach of the portal also evolved from 129 countries in 2019 to 169 in 2020.



During the year, the Knowledge Network organised seven webinars presented by leading researchers to make recent, policy-relevant research more accessible to a global public audience. These discussions attracted 951 live attendees, and 582 viewers post-event (further information on the webinar series is available in the events section of this report).



# GOVERNING HEALTH FUTURES 2030: GROWING UP IN A DIGITAL WORLD

The joint The Lancet & Financial Times Commission *Governing health futures 2030: Growing up in a digital world* is exploring the convergence of digital health, artificial intelligence (AI), and other transformative technologies with universal health coverage to support attainment of the third Sustainable Development Goal (SDG). It aims to identify specific instruments to safeguard the rights of children and young people, as well as opportunities to engage in this discussion.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

Launched in October 2019, the Commission's work evolved dramatically over the course of 2020, during which the bulk of the research and writing of the report *Governing health futures 2030: Growing up in a digital world* took place, alongside efforts to inspire global stakeholder engagement and involve the imaginations and voices of youth. The goal of this report is to become a tool for private and public sector stakeholders to help shape policy and governance decisions regarding the digital transformation in health and its impact on universal health coverage. In 2020, the Commission's research and policy efforts have become increasingly visible through online events and policy dialogues, social media activities, and targeted stakeholder engagement, both with academic, public sector, and youth through the work of the Commission Secretariat, and with the private sector through the efforts led by the Financial Times.

Two Commission Meetings took place during the year and working groups were established on topics including data and paradigms, readiness and agency, governance and stewardship, digital frontiers, health futures, and digital childhoods. While Commissioners and the Secretariat drafted most of the text internally, a number of externally commissioned papers were also produced, including those on health data governance, AI and ethics, online activism, children's rights and digital health, and digital marketing. The Commission also hosted or co-hosted online policy dialogues, with partners including Wilton Park, IFRC, the European Health Forum Gastein, Fondation Botnar, and the Global Health Young Professionals Initiative. The Commission jointly launched an initiative called *Imagining Health Futures* with UNICEF, which invites published science fiction authors to speculate about the future of health in writers' room workshops engaging global youth, culminating in short story visions of health futures.

The next phase of work will be dedicated to finalising the report text, establishing plans for research dissemination, and translating policy into action.

The project focuses on data governance, digital cooperation and AI to maximise the potential of these powerful technologies for good while avoiding their misuse and missed use. I-DAIR presents an opportunity to reinvent and reinvigorate the delivery of health services across the world. Its aim is to promote responsible and inclusive AI research and digital development for health by establishing a neutral platform for global research collaborations.

### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

The first year of the project focused on clarifying I-DAIR's value-add for national and regional efforts, building a diverse trans-disciplinary team and putting together key policy, funding and scientific partnerships. These efforts culminated in a successful application for a Fondation Botnar grant, which will fund the project for a period of two years. In August 2020, I-DAIR's Director was joined by five new team members to build the path to a full launch of the I-DAIR platform in 2022. Three key themes are being pursued: federated research into global challenges, the inclusive engagement of researchers and entrepreneurs from the Global South through an innovative architecture, and the establishment of an Impact Fund. In 2020, I-DAIR began to engage partners across academia, industry, civil society, governments, and foundations. A partnership was developed at the outset with WHO; since then cooperation agreements have been signed with academic and research partners such as the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, FIND and the IEEE. A draft resource-mobilisation and engagement strategy has been put together to leverage high-level political support and a significant replenishment following the launch in 2022. I-DAIR has also taken the first steps to concretise its research enabling function along its priority areas of exploration, called PathFinders. Research projects under the PathFinders help develop cross-cutting approaches that facilitate the digital transformation of health systems; they also help surface governance insights that reduce the lag between technology deployment and normative responses.

Key priority areas identified in 2020 include (1) development of a research map in the area of digital health and AI; (2) building interoperable data architectures so that countries can go from paper to digital to AI; (3) development of a suite of human-centred benchmarks using micro narratives and other patient engagement tool; and (4) designing science-based and people-centric predictive models to facilitate real-time epidemiology and dashboards. I-DAIR is also developing hubs in Geneva, Singapore, New Delhi, Santiago, Tunis and Nairobi to ensure global engagement. Hubs and affiliate centres will eventually come together as a network of research and innovation centres.



## WHO GLOBAL HEALTH DIPLOMACY TRAINING

This project aims to develop an introductory guide for health attachés, WHO staff, professionals and other health actors. Since 2019, the project team has been developing an open access training manual on global health diplomacy that will be translated into several languages, including Portuguese and Chinese.

Written, reviewed and supported by global health experts from different backgrounds, countries and sectors, this book provides key concepts on global health diplomacy, outlines the major actors and activities shaping the global health ecosystem, and presents practical tools to strengthen negotiation skills.

### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

The project started with identifying key elements for the creation of the global health diplomacy toolbox in 2019 and continued with writing and collecting information for the main publication “[A Guide to Global Health Diplomacy](#)”. The training material includes two new case studies that analyse and summarise the leading practices in global health, diplomacy, and governance – one focuses on negotiating at the UN, and the other on WHO.

In 2021, the project team will compile additional case studies on the practice of global health diplomacy and develop an approach to training in collaboration with the WHO academy.



## PROJECTS COMPLETED IN 2020

### POLIO ERADICATION: OVERCOMING THE FINAL BARRIERS AND ENSURING A LASTING LEGACY FOR HEALTH SYSTEMS

This project explored the critical dimensions of the global effort to eradicate polio, focusing on overcoming the final barriers and ensuring a lasting legacy for health systems as well as the role of European countries in this effort. This research analysed the successes and failures of polio and other eradication programmes to derive broader lessons relating to global health governance.

#### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN 2020

In 2020, the research team broadened its activities to include two significant new lines of research to inform ongoing conversations about the long-term sustainability of resources for disease eradication programmes, and ways to best ensure lasting contributions to health systems. One line of this research sought to better understand how European governments make decisions to allocate funding for global health programmes. For this research, the team examined funding trends over the past decade, and interviewed 17 government officials across the 10 largest European government funders of development assistance for health. The second line of research asked how major disease eradication programmes of the 20<sup>th</sup> century did or did not contribute to the strengthening of health systems. This second topic involved extensive reviews of primary and secondary literature pertaining to the seven major disease eradication initiatives conducted over the past century. The team generated a set of novel observations across these two research arms. The research identified political and technocratic factors, operating both within and across governments, affecting how European governments set priorities for global health funding. Project members also specified several ways the large international eradication programmes of the 20<sup>th</sup> century contributed to strengthening health systems. Researchers found that eradication initiatives contributed to the main 'building blocks' of health systems, including health service delivery, health workforce, health information systems, and elements of leadership and governance; however, they observed that there were fewer contributions to health system financing and that the availability of medical products, and contributions to the other building blocks were uneven across eradication initiatives. In November, the research team published a [working paper](#) "How European Countries Fund Global Health: Unpacking Decision-Making and Priority-Setting Processes" and disseminated the findings of the study via a [GHC research seminar](#). A second working paper is to be completed by early 2021. Both manuscripts will be published in peer-reviewed journals in 2021.



## EU'S ROLE IN GLOBAL HEALTH

The objective of this project was to explore the role of the European Union in Global Health. The GHC and the Ministry of Social Affairs and Health of Finland cooperated to map the main political actors and influencers at the EU level, reflect on the EU's challenges and opportunities, and identify gaps in the global health field. In 2020, Ilona Kickbusch and Christian Franz published a [working paper](#) "Towards a synergistic global health strategy in the EU" to present the results of the research.

## CHALLENGES OF GOVERNING THE GLOBAL HEALTH DOMAIN

This project examined shifts in global health governance and explored ways to strengthen the provision of global public goods in the spirit of the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the emergence of "wicked problems" such as antimicrobial resistance. It investigated the emerging political, economic and social dynamics, as well as the changing roles of different stakeholders in the global health domain. In 2020, this project was re-oriented to focus on Covid-19. The research examined the performance of the global health system in Covid-19 and post-Covid reforms. The team provided insight into post-Ebola reforms and how they have affected the Covid-19 response.

## GLOBAL GOVERNANCE OF ACCESS TO COUNTERMEASURES

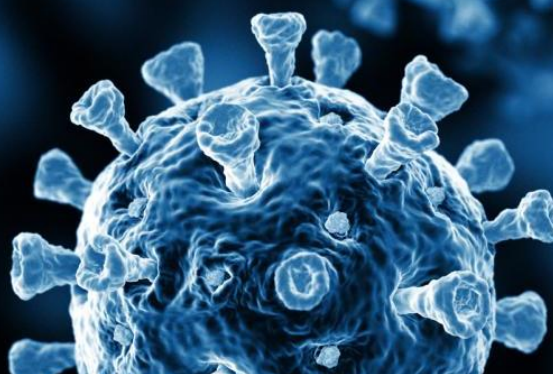

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## PUBLIC EVENTS

The Global Health Centre has established itself as a host for a wide-range of policy dialogues, roundtables, research seminars and other public events. Through its convening activities, the Centre aims to add new or underrepresented health issues to the public agenda, disseminate recent research outputs, open debate on sensitive questions, and increase understanding of current health challenges. In 2020, the Centre hosted 41 public dialogues, lectures, and panel discussions. During the year, a total of 6,792 participants working for governmental institutions, international organisations, media agencies and the private sector joined the Global Health Centre to discuss and analyse the repercussions of the Covid-19 pandemic, the political determinants of health, the impact of new technologies on human rights, the role of the World Health Organization, the female health workforce as well as access to medicines. Each event brought together experts from different fields and sectors to break down silos, encourage synergies and articulate potential solutions to global health issues. The Centre also promoted collaboration between the Global North and the Global South through the diversity of its panels. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, all events took place online, and included a written Q&A session to ensure active participation from the audience.



The Centre launched a weekly webinar series on Covid-19 in March to observe the evolution of the health crisis and provide high-quality information on key questions emerging with the spread of the epidemic. These webinars discussed the interconnections between Covid-19 and law, finance, trade, human rights, geopolitics, digital health, the food system, and immunisation programmes.



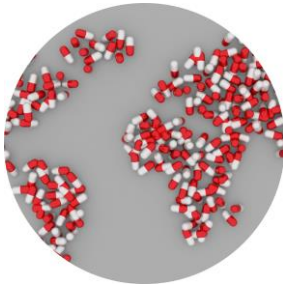
The Centre hosted its famous *Geneva Health Week* during the 73<sup>rd</sup> World Health Assembly, including a briefing for delegates which attracted 547 participants from 67 countries, as well as 5 events co-organised through an open application process. Due to the exceptional circumstances generated by the Covid-19 pandemic, the GHC and the UN Foundation organised a second introduction to the World Health Assembly in November as well as a panel discussion on the WHO Executive Board.



In accordance with its 2020-2024 strategy, the Centre developed an Open Global Health series of events to promote frank, transparent and thought-provoking conversations about power, inequality, accountability and decolonising global health.



To present global health research conducted by the Centre and partners, five research seminars were organised during the year. The themes of these seminars focused on social accountability and contraceptive care, the politics of global health data, the family planning movement and its impact on reproductive health, global health funding of European countries, and the implications of the data wave for human rights.



Through its *Knowledge Network for Innovation and Access to Medicines*, the Centre held seven webinars presented by leading researchers in the field of intellectual property, innovation and pharmaceutical pricing. These conversations promoted new resources and facilitated collaborations between different health actors in order to promote global access to medicines.

Additional presentations, panel discussions, and project launches took place during the year. The following pages provide an overview of all our 2020 events.



## INTERNATIONAL GENEVA GLOBAL HEALTH PLATFORM

Throughout the years, the Global Health Centre has positioned its activities within the context of International Geneva with the aim of strengthening the city as a “global health capital”. Since its creation, the Centre has been working with some of the most influential health organisations and has actively participated in Swiss initiatives such as the Geneva Health Forum. In this context, the GHC signed a multi-year contract with the Swiss Department of Foreign Affairs to strengthen Geneva as a hub of global health. Through its International Geneva Global Health Platform, the Centre engages with a wide-range of institutions and acts as a laboratory of global health innovation. From 2014 to 2020, the Platform has encouraged a vast number of Geneva-based actors to work together on topics of common concern, and built cross-sectoral synergies. In 2020, the Global Health Platform hosted 24 online discussions with several Geneva-based actors such as the WHO, UHC2030, STOPAIDS, the Global Alliance for Improved Nutrition, the UN Foundation, the Global Governance Centre, Women in Global Health and others to address global health challenges and facilitate cooperation between key stakeholders.

Getting outbreaks under control requires effective national and global governance across many areas – from detecting cases to countering misinformation, from scientific research to minimising trade restrictions. During this lunch briefing organised by the Graduate Institute, Suerie Moon presented the current state of the global governance of outbreaks, and highlighted areas that require urgent attention.

### Pathogen and Benefit-Sharing: Where Next in the Global Governance of Outbreaks?

8 December 2020 | At the culmination of a 2-year research project, the GHC organised a public discussion to launch a new report that exposes vulnerabilities in the global governance of outbreaks. Access to pathogen samples and the sharing of the benefits that arise from their use is a growing global health concern. Across recent outbreaks, including Ebola, Zika, and the newly emergent SARS-CoV-2, questions on how samples should be shared, for what purpose, and what amounts to fair and equitable benefit-sharing from their use have been central considerations. This virtual event discussed the politics and practices of how pathogens and related benefits are negotiated, both globally and in the specific cases of Liberia's Ebola and Brazil's Zika epidemics. A group of experts reflected on the adequacy of existing arrangements, the need for new governance approaches, and political opportunities in light of the Covid-19 pandemic.

## PROFESSIONAL TRAINING

Since 2008, the Global Health Centre has been providing training and capacity building in global health diplomacy and governance to more than 1600 senior level professionals from 100 countries. In 2020, the Centre delivered three courses for international professionals from government ministries, international and non-governmental organisations, academia and the business sector. The courses organised by the Centre are highly participatory, drawing on the national and international experiences of participants through a multi-disciplinary learning process. They include lectures by internationally-renowned experts and negotiators, case studies, working groups and negotiation simulation exercises. The Centre offered two courses in English and one course in French developed in collaboration with the Senegalese Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Centre had to reconceptualise its courses in 2020 and move them online.

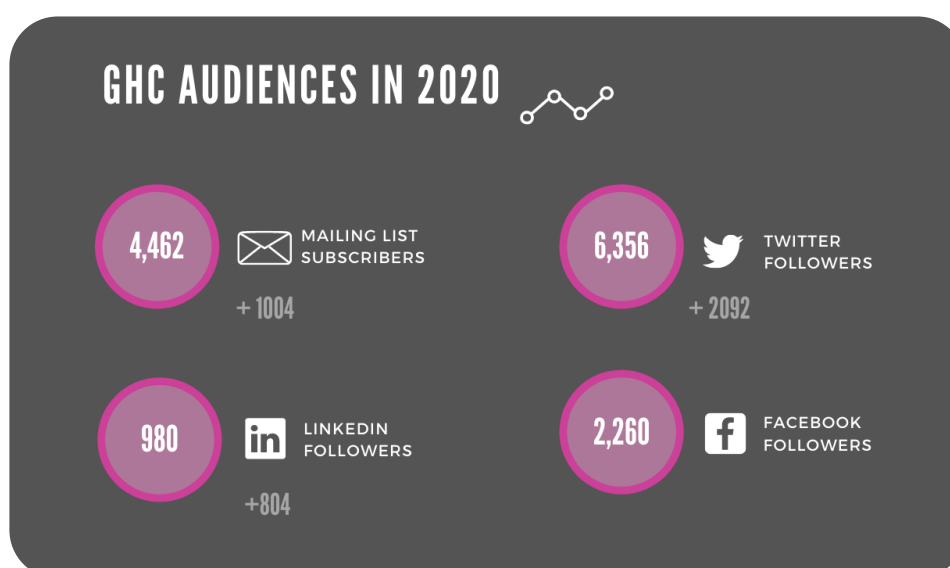

# OUTREACH AND PUBLIC IMPACT OF THE CENTRE

## COMMUNICATIONS ACTIVITIES AND OUTREACH

The Global Health Centre promotes its research, convening and education activities through various communications channels (website, email announcements, Twitter, Facebook, LinkedIn). These platforms regularly provide information on recent publications, research outputs, events and courses as well as opinion pieces and commentaries on different health issues. The Centre also publishes four newsletters during the year to facilitate knowledge sharing among the global health community. The GHC interacts with different key audiences including representatives from governmental institutions, universities and research centres, non-governmental organisations, media agencies and the private sector in Geneva and beyond. The Centre increased its communications actions as well as its presence on social media in 2020 to expand its outreach. The audiences of the GHC have been considerably growing since 2019. In 2020, the Centre gained 1,004 newsletter subscribers, 2,092 Twitter followers and 804 LinkedIn readers. Audience engagement also developed during the year, especially on social media. Our Twitter audience was particularly active in 2020, and engaged with the GHC account on a daily basis via mentions, comments, likes, link clicks, and replies. The Twitter account of the GHC generated over 1,172,200 impressions in 2020 while the total number of impressions in 2019 was 224,569.



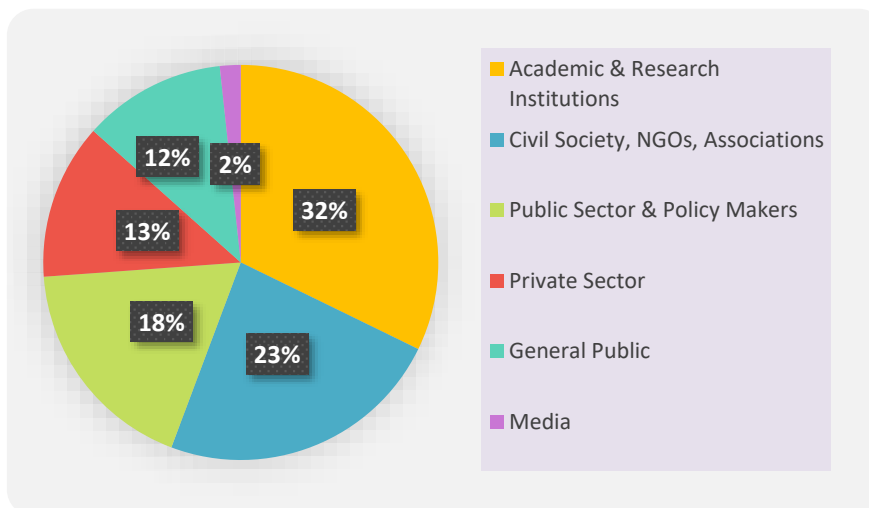
## COMMUNICATIONS PARTNERSHIPS

The Centre collaborated with media partners such as Health Policy Watch and Mediapart in 2020 to advertise its content to a new public and expand its geographical reach. In addition, the GHC coordinated communications actions with external organisations to intensify the promotion of its research, convening and education activities. Medicus Mundi, the Think Thank Hub, the International Geneva Platform and the Graduate Institute regularly supported the communications efforts of the Centre by relaying messages to their respective audiences.

The GHC is active on multiple platforms and communicates with a diverse audience to support the mission of the Centre, disseminate research findings, strengthen public engagement and raise awareness on critical health issues. The target audiences of the Centre include:

- journalists and media outlets covering global health, politics and development

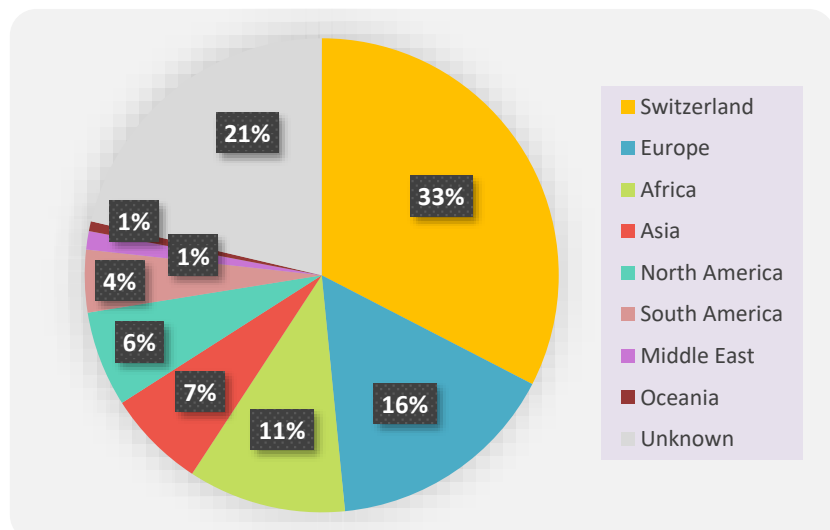


In 2020, the Centre conducted an audience analysis to identify its principal audience groups, observe trends, and better orient its communications actions and priorities. ## PUBLIC IMPACT OF THE CENTRE'S WORK

The Global Health Centre regularly contributes to ongoing global health policy processes through its academic intelligence. By hosting and engaging in public events, roundtables, policy consultations and dialogues, the Centre aims to influence the global health agenda, and better equip diplomats, health attachés, activists, researchers and other policy makers. In 2020, the Centre participated in several Swiss initiatives and international meetings such as the Geneva Health Forum, the World Health Summit, the Annual International G20 Conference, the Geneva Trade Week, the International AIDS Conference, the AI for Good Summit, the Canadian Recovery Summit, the European Health Forum of Gastein, the Global Forum on Health Promotion, the World Conference on Lung Health, and others. Members of the GHC participated in **52 external panel discussions** organised by the World Bank, the NCD Alliance, the National University of Singapore, Chatham House, the Arab Center in Washington, Saluderecho, the UK Parliament, Médecins Sans Frontières, and the British Institute of International and Comparative Law, among others.

Through its expertise, the Centre regularly supports the development of documentaries, reports and articles. GHC researchers took part in many TV shows, radio programmes and press articles during the year to discuss global health challenges and particularly the evolution of the Covid-19 crisis. Over **355 media appearances** were generated in 2020 in international media outlets such as The New York Times, The Financial Times, Radio Télévision Suisse; Le Temps, the BBC, CNN, NZZ, Le Monde, Afrique Magazine, The Washington Post, AFP, The Lancet, Nature, Reuters, ARD, Le Journal de Québec, Radio Canada, Forbes, The Guardian, Sky News, Euronews, Deutsche Welle, ZDF, Radio New Zealand, National Geographic, La República, among others (full list available in Annex 2).
